Tavern Night, Gala Victorian Dinner to headline fall Anniversary Year activities




Our fall schedule is full of events to enlighten and entertain you. On Saturday, October 1, beginning at 7:00 p.m., a Colonial Tavern Night will be hosted by John Harris, Jr. (portrayed by David Biser) and friends in the mansion. The evening

will offer a glimpse into the life of the community at Harris' Ferry when Mr. Harris operated a tavern along the banks of the Susquehanna. Colonial games and singing will be interspersed with a special tasting of "the spirits of the Signers," with drinks served at Philadelphia's City Tavern in 1776, presented by Murray Small of Dillsburg. Whiskeys made from an 18th century recipe will be accompanied by tastings of mead and beer, common homemade drinks of the period. Snacks and other edibles will be provided. Tickets are \$30 per person (over 21, please), and reservations may be placed by calling our office at (717) 233-3462 or emailing office@dauphincountyhistory.org. Major credit cards accepted.

The décor and music of the period will provide the setting for a Gala Victorian Dinner by the JDK Group caterers at 6:00 p.m. on Saturday, November 19, in the mansion's public rooms. The evening will



start with hors d'œuvres, followed by dinner of Spiced Red Lentil, Tomato and Kale Soup; Sole Meunière with Pommes Château; Chicken Fricasée with Farro Rissoto; pineapple mint sorbet, a palate cleanser; and Braised beef Short Rib. Chocolate Plum Cake garnished with rose petals will complete the evening's fare. Wine and beer will be presented by the Vineyard and Brewery at Hershey. Formal attire or period dress are optional.


GHOST TOURS OF THE MANSION

Author Paul Kahan's biography of Simon Cameron has recently been published by the University of Nebraska Press. *Amiable Scoundrel* is also a portrait of an era thatallowed—indeed, encouraged—a man such as Cameron to seize political control. Kahan and a panel of distinguished regional scholars will discuss the aspects of the mansion's famous resident that made him controversial during his lifetime and into ours. At 2:30 p.m. Howard Parker, Harris-Cameron Mansion docent and resident Thomas Elder reenactor, will discuss the impact that mansion owners Robert Harris and Thomas Elder had on the candidacy and eventual election of William Henry Harrison (1773-1841) to the presidency of the United States. Harris' close friendship with Harrison resulted in Harrisburg's *Pennsylvania Intelligencer* becoming the first newspaper in the nation to propose Harrison as a candidate for the presidency. 

First Adopt-an-Artifact donors step forward



ociety members Jack and Rachel Bair have adopted a stick-style barometer commissioned in 1837 by the state legislature as the firstever object to be restored under the new program. Every county in the state received a barometer from the Franklin Institute in Philadelphia

"for the progression of weather patterns for the benefit of agriculture and the furtherance of scientific knowledge." Both of the Bairs were science teachers for many years in Susquehanna Township, Dauphin County. "Jack taught physics, and I taught chemistry," says Mrs. Bair, "so the choice of this particular artifact seems logical for us." Many thanks to the Bairs for this gift.
