

Founders' Day event on June 25 to include encampments, food, fun for the whole family – and it's free!



Round up the children and grandchildren and bring them to the Harris-Cameron Mansion on Saturday, June 25, for a day of fun, entertainment, and learning at Founders' Day, an exploration of frontier and Colonial life known to both John Harris, Sr. and Jr.

arris, Sr. had come from
England in the early 1700s
and operated a ferry and
trading post at what was
known as Harris' Ferry. In 1727 his
son John, Jr. was born and by 1748

took over his father's businesses. In 1766 Harris built his stone mansion, earned a good reputation with the native peoples with whom he traded, and died in 1791. It is in this era that we place our Founders' Day celebration.

Founders' Day is open from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The day's activities will include military encampments of the 1st Pennsylvania Regiment and the Donegal Riflemen, a Native American encampment, crafts and games for kids with staff from Fort Hunter Mansion and Park, storytelling, food vendors, and the Popcorn Hat Players – a kids' favorite – at 11:00 a.m. John Harris, Jr. himself will be here to talk about his life at Harris' Ferry, Harrisburg's earliest settlement. The kids will also have the chance to dress up in

Colonial garb, so bring your camera!

The day is free of charge and open to the public, with plenty of free parking in PinnacleHealth lots nearby. Tours of the Mansion will be available at no cost



to Historical Society members and at the discounted rate of \$5 for visitors 17 and older. # Restoration and refurnishing of mansion continue as wallpaper comes and goes



With your support and that of other individuals, institutions, and businesses, we have been able to continue the first large-scale restoration of the National Historic Landmark mansion since the 1980s. Exterior restoration is virtually complete.

This spring appropriate wallpaper was hung in the area just outside the solarium and in the office of Gen. Simon Cameron. Modern paper was removed the former "toy room," which has been painted as the first step to converting that space into a lady's dressing room, where vintage clothing and accessories from our collections will be exhibited.

A plan has been drawn up to restore Cameron's solarium with its 19th-century French wallpaper in need of repainting and restoration of the marble flooring. Donors are being sought to fund this project.

This spring our Facilities Committee tackled the gardens with the aid of garden clubs and master gardeners, taking first steps to re-casting the gardens into the Victorian style appropriate for the house left to us by Simon Cameron's family in 1941. Future projects include stabilization and restoration of limestone and brick walls and iron fencing surrounding the historic house.

# State Museum archaeologist to speak at June 12 open house



Kurt Carr, Senior Curator of Archaeology at the State Museum of Pennsylvania and author of "First Pennsylvanians: The Archaeology of Native Americans," will speak on Sunday, June 12, at 2:30 p.m. in the Victorian Parlor of

the mansion. Carr will discuss the story of Native Americans in the area that became Harrisburg.

Carr is a graduate of Franklin and Marshall College and has earned a PhD in anthropology from the Catholic University of America, Washington, D.C. In recent years, Carr and the staff of the Section of Archaeology have performed work at Fort Hunter Mansion, identifying and excavating features around the smoke house foundation and at the back porch, where a number of Native American trade goods have been found.

If restoration is something you would like to do (alone or share with family and friends), please ask to see what artifacts are still available for you to "adopt."



Rebecca Orth Reily (1796-1854) was painted by Pennsylvania artist John F. Francis (1808-1886).




The upholstered divan to the right is believed to have been part of the furnishings of the mansion while the Cameron family was in residence. Its upholstery is torn and its stuffing falling out. The chair belonged to Simon Cameron and may well have been in his office. Imagine what dignitaries may have sat in it.



Is it evident that the Cameron chair, while still sturdy, needs cleaning. Reproduction fabrics can approximate the look of the original.


