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The Journal of Charles Rawn
June 1 to June 30, 1834 (Book 5)

Introduction

During the month of June, 1834, attorney Charles C. Rawn recorded daily entries in his journal, including brief remarks on the weather and his professional, family and personal activities. June seemed to be a cool start to the summer season, according to Rawn's weather notations. Frequently clear and beautiful, the temperature remained low enough that he was required to "have fire" in his office during the month's early days and wear "Big Coats" for comfort while working in his office and at the Supreme Court. Later in the month, temperatures became warmer with rain and occasional thunder gusts. Rawn left off his Muslin undershirt for the first time of the season on June 24, a day he describes as clear, cloudy and very warm.

Throughout the month, Rawn pursued certain pastimes: walking or riding horses early in the morning for exercise before the heat of the day, and walking in the cool evenings with his wife, Frances, who is mentioned in numerous entries along with members of her family, the Clendenins. Together, Charles and Frances visited and took tea with friends and family, strolled along the canal, dined on strawberries and cream and enjoyed cool ice cream.

Sundays found Rawn and his family attending DeWitt's church (Presbyterian) or visiting other congregations including the Methodist church. It was a day of rest and relaxation.

Rawn's professional legal responsibilities occupied much of his time. He attended cases at the Supreme Court and provided legal services to many clients. Correspondence was vital to his role as an attorney, and he recorded letters received and written, accompanied by the postage costs that he paid.

Rawn used his journal to record a variety of financial transactions. The meticulous accounting includes monies owed to him from clients, payments made to clients, payments received on accounts, money expended in the purchase of land as sole owner and in partnership, and amounts paid for goods, clothing and medicine secured at a number of Harrisburg stores and hotels. Payments made to his valet, Jacob, and a black man for services rendered, are also recorded. He paid \$2.00 to his mother-in-law Clendenin for boarding the black girl, Susan, on June 9, 1834. Rawn seems a generous and compassionate individual who gave small amounts of money to the poor and to children.

Attorney Rawn's position in society is suggested by his associations with other prominent attorneys, judges and members of Congress from the Harrisburg district. These professional relationships sometimes extended into evening social engagements involving Rawn's wife and the wives and daughters of his peers.

While Rawn recorded very few details about his wife, Frances' wardrobe other than mentioning a silk dress, a belt, side combs, bonnet bows, and flowered handkerchiefs, he stated he received a black bombazine vest and pantaloons from G.S. Kemble (Taylor) [sic] on Saturday, June 7, 1834. These men's garments are of interest as a clue to Rawn's position in Harrisburg society. Black bombazine was a favorite period

fabric for men's summer formal wear and for formal mourning.¹ Pantaloon were very much in fashion, also for men's formal wear until the mid-nineteenth century, being a transitional style between the breeches of the eighteenth century and the looser trousers popular post-1825 for general use. Pantaloon fitted closely, like tights, and often had side slits that buttoned at the ankles and straps under the instep to keep them taut.² With his matching black vest, and white shirt, collar, cravat, and frock coat, Rawn could cut a fine figure in company.

Perhaps the most significant day of the month was June 27 when Rawn attended a Town Meeting at the Court House in Harrisburg to make arrangements for a memorial service to honor the memory of the Marquis de LaFayette, supporter of the American Revolution, advisor to George Washington, and Major General who fought on the American side at Brandywine and Yorktown, and who died the previous month on May 20, 1834.³ Unfortunately, Rawn did not include details of the planned ceremony.

The month closed quietly with rain and slight illness – Frances had a "soar" throat and Rawn himself took medicine to counteract bile.

Overall, the entries made by attorney Charles C. Rawn in his journal during June 1834 described the busy, active daily round of a respectable and responsible, 31-year old professional gentleman who exhibited Victorian morals in his dedication to family, work, religion, charity and friendship.

The Journal

June 1~1 [Sunday, June 1, 1834] Rain. Was at DE Witts Church morning & afternoon with “Frances” – Mahon preached in Afternoon. Saw & conversed with Jas Buchanan Esqr late Minister to Russia this Evening at Buckley Hotel – also with Wm White Esqr of Phila. & William Ramsey Esqr of Cumberland Co. Borrowed “Globe” of 30 May 34 at “Franklins.

June 2nd – 1834 Monday

day of mo 2~2 [Monday, June 2, 1834] Clear & Beautiful – wrote to A. Green Esqr Col L. Co Pa enclosing Rule to take Depositions in 336 of aforsd 1834. Hetzel vs Shannon & sent it all by Mr Alexander Glafs – left the Copy of the Rule & notice to take Depositions in the Aforsd case at the home of Mr Shannon this evening by putting it into his Entry under his Door. Witnefs Mifs Thomas [?] Mr Davis. Paid for segars at Sheles 12 1/2 cs. Wrote to Geo. M. Dallas Atty Genl Phila & pd Pos 12 1/2 to be informed whether he would consider it my duty to appear to suits brought by or against the Comth before I was appointed Deputy. Paid for Sundries at Knox’s 2 cs

3~3 [Tuesday, June 3, 1834] Clear. Cool. have Fire in my office this morning Miss Nancy Shunk here at 7 1/2 A.M. while I make this note. Paid Jacob (my valet) 6 cts. Took ride this afternoon on Natl Henries horse for 2 hours 6 or 8 miles in Company with S Shoch Esqr on one of Snyders Bays. Went with Frances & Mary half-way to Church this Evening. Was at Supreme Court short time this morning & afternoon.

4~4 [Wednesday, June 4, 1834] Clear & beautiful in Morning – Rain in afternoon. Went to Su. Court this morning with Shoch Esqr & spoke with Canal Commissioner Mitchell about “Weigh Master” Rec’d letter from David Breed “West Chester, Pa June 1, 1834” Paid Pos. 10 - & answered Same day.

5~5 [Thursday, June 5, 1834] Cloudy. Windy & Rain. Handed “Frances” \$10.00 to buy Silk dress – called on Chief Justice Gibson at his room at Wilson Hotel at 9 A.M. to see how he was, having been Sick – found him better & going to Court today – Paid for Sundries at Wilsons and Hahulens 7 cts. Wrote note to Jos. B Henzy Esqr (present) to pay me \$10 that he owes. Fire in my office this morning & in S. Court Room & Big Coats worn. R.Rofs married to Mary Halderman had a Son born last night at 10 P.M. I am told.

6~6 [Friday, June 6, 1834] Clear & Beautiful & pleasant. Recd of Commrs of Dauphin Co Dept of Atty Genls Fees \$8.50 in Nos. 2, 15, 22 of April SS 1834 being Comth vs Battis & Crabb, same vs [?], & same vs Cook. Rec’d letter Dr. Jas. Fitzpatrick Williamsport Mo. May 29/34 by hand of a young man (I think Brady) at my office.

June 6 – 1834 Friday

day of mo 6~6 cont do Rec’d of Mo. Fox Shff. Bal. Of Debt & interest \$108 (\$5 having been previously recd by Mr Evans) & Atty Legal Fee \$4. in No. 104 of April Term 1834 (Evans vs Heis & Lowman) & of Mo Evans 5 pr ct. for collection making Fee \$5.40 & entered Satisfaction for Pltff on Docket. Deposited in “The Harrisburg Bank” \$112. Got

on Bay Horse of Natl Henries in afternoon to take ride Retd him in 15 minutes on account of his roughnefs. Mr & Mrs Peacock took tea with us this Evening after which we all walked down to Peacocks after which they went to Church to DE Witts

7~7 [Saturday, June 7, 1834] Clear & pleasant – recd letters from Geo. M. Dallas Atty Genl “Phila 5 June ‘34” & pd Pos 12 1/2cts also from Jas Benners aforsd. of D. Stuckert & Co Phila June 5 1834. & pd pos 12 1/2 had Stove remd from My office into Small lumber room in Court House pd Black man to help Jacob (my valet) 3 cts & pd Jacob my valet 9 cts. Attended Arbitration of Stitzer vs Katterman for Pltff No 178 Apl 1834. B. Parke opposing counsel – Paid for a pair of Side Combs for Frances at Miss Wilsons 75 cts – Bought at Mr. Johnsons auction this evening (being then with Shoch & Harris Esqr) 3 Flowered handkerchiefs for 56 1/4 cts & gave to Frances one of which she gave to M.L. Clendenin.

8~1 [Sunday, June 8, 1834] Clear & very warm. Was at DE Witts Church with “Frances” (who communed with them for the first time that she had communed in her life) three times today. Rev. Mr. McCulloh preached in morning. Paid for Segars at Wilsons 6 1/4. Rec’d Black Bombazine Vest & pantaloons from G.S. Kemble (Taylor) last evening.

9~2 [Monday, June 9, 1834] Clear & Warm. Paid Mother Clendenin of Satty. Eveng last at Supper for Black Girl Susan credit my account for Boarding [intentional triple underline of ‘Boarding’] \$2.00. Satr last paid John Evans by a check on “The Harrisburg

Bank” \$102.60/100 in full of money collected for him in 104 of April [?] 1834 (after deducting my Fees) vide his Receipt & vide Entry of the 6th ultimo supra – Treasurers Sale of Unseated Lands in the Court House today – I attended at Esqr. Davies.

June 9 – 1834 Monday

day of mo 9~2 cont’d office this afternoon from 2 PM to 4 ½ PM. in case of Charles Lee vs Lyon & Morgan, for plaintiff McCormick Esqr for Defendant – recd of Chas. Lee Fee \$5, Paid for sundries at Smulls, & for Mineral Water “Frances & Self” at Lochmans 12 ½ cts & went home from Peacocks at 9 ½ P.M. where was all one Family & Ch. Jus. Gibson.

10~3 [Tuesday, June 10, 1834] Clear. Very warm. Paid for white Grafts Material for Round about this morning at Elders Carson & Espys \$1.87 ½. I Bought Lot 250 in Plot of Portsmouth near, or at Middletown Dau. County at Treasurers Sale for taxes for \$20. Went with “Frances” & Mary Scott after tea to “Franklins.” Heavy rain & thunder gust this evening.

11~4 [Wednesday, June 11, 1834] Clear & Beautiful, Cooler. A man by name of Mo. Walters from Linglestown in my office this morning Stranger to me but called me by name – a little fuddled – shook hands when he went away – told me “I see you’re a pretty Smart Young Fellow I’ll bring you Some business” & I wrote note by Jacob Walters to Jos. B. Henzy Esqr to pay me ten dollars he owes me – Jacob returned & said he had handed the note to Henzy who said that he would come down Soon to day & bring the

money present Mr. Rudy in my office. Bought Several Lots in Portsmouth to day in Co with Charles Carson No _____ & No _____ by myself at Treasurers sale for taxes. Gave 12 ½ cts to John Hargens who says he was a Soldier in the late war between America & Great Britain, who came to this country from Ireland in 1794 enlisted in Little York in May '98 was disbanded with the army in June '98 is a nailor by trade, went from York to Pittsburg & from there into Kentucky where in '99 he enlisted again & Served in the northern army in the late war. Mo [?] my Brotherinlaw reading in my office also gave him something. Shoch Esqr with Mary L Clendenin & Myself with "Frances" went to Shannons at 8.P.M. to eat Strawberries & Cream. Got 4 Tumblers of them & pd 37 ½ My share of 75 cts. Then went to Mr. Peacock to see Mrs. Chief Jus. Gibson & Mifses Eliza & _____ Kennedy daughters of Justice Kennedy and went home at 9 ¾ P.M. [?] of Comth [?] with Many -----

June 12 – 1834 Thursday

day of mo 12~5 [Thursday, June 12, 1834]. Clear & Beautiful – I rode after breakfast from 7 AM. To 8 AM. On Grey [?] Horse of Natl. Henries to Cox's Town 3 ½ miles up the river & back again & Served notice on T.A. Appleton defendant in 148 Jany T. 1834 that we will choose Arbitrators on the 1 July next. Personally he being in a Dearbourne with another man coming toward Harrisburg & near Mr. Cox's house when I handed & left with him a Copy of the entry of rule & ----- after my return went down to Peacocks (to see them) where was Justice Kennedy & two Daughters, Chief Justice Gibson & Lady & Young Daughter with whom Mifs E. Peacock & M.L. Clendenin & Frances I went to Capitol to See S. Court Room &c, recd of Thos MCurdy of Lan. County for professional

advice \$5 Fee & wrote note again to Jos. B. Henzy Esqr for \$10 he owes me & Sent by Jacob (my valet) & Recd in reply an order on Major Mr. Forster for \$9. Paid Toll this morning 3 cts. Frances & Self took walk on the Canal this Evening. Paid for Sundries at Knox 2 cts. 13~6 [Friday, June 13, 1834] Clear, & Cool. Took ride from 5 ¼ oclock A.M. this morning to 6 ¼ A.M. on Natl Henries Gray [?] Horse. Paid for spool of Cotton, 10 cts. Last evening pd McCreary for cutting Round about 12 ½ cts. Timothy Lyons (Irishman) in my office with Danl Brady & left note of \$40 against Mo W McKinney for Collection Paid Jacob (my valet) 3 cts. Gave a Poorwoman apparently aged 51 to 57 who says her name is Sarah Smith & that she lives 3 miles beyond Lebanon 12 ½ cts present. Mr. Jos. C. Shoch Esqr & Self took walk on canal this Evening & went to Wilsons Hotel where I pd for wine 12 ½ cts. Recd Letter from Ashbel Green Esqr “Col” Lan. Co. June 12/34 Enclosing Deposition of Mr Glafs in Hetzel vs Shannon No. 336 of April 1834 and Paid pos. 12 ½ cts. Thos G McCulloh Esqr of Chambersburg & F R Shunk were at our house this Evening a short time – I went to Meeting for Frances at 9 ¼ oclock

June 14, 1834 – Saturday

day of mo 14~7 [Saturday, June 14, 1834] Clear & pleasant – Paid Jacob (my valet) 6 ¼ Took drink of Ale this morning at noon with Asher Miner & F.R. Shunk at invitation of Caller at Wilsons Hotel & in afternoon took drink of wine at same place with Shock

Esqr. Went with Mary Scott & Frances after tea to Rhoads & CappStones to Mr Camerons, Judge Fahnestocks & Buehlens and then to Mrs Musgraves where was Mrs Wharton Mrs Darie & Miss Watts the three called just from Phila. Paid for Belt for Frances at Capps 28 cts attended "Shffs Jury" of Condemnation at Jail in case of Thos Woodsides property & then returned to Musgraves & took Frances home ----- Paid for Sundries 2 cts

15~1 [Sunday, June 15, 1834] Clear & Cloudy & Cool. Wrote to D.W. Rawn this afternoon at Phila & pd pos 12 ½ telling him that the Canal Comm will be there this week. Paid for Legacy last Evening at Shells & [?] 12 ½ cts. Was at DE Witt Church Morning & Afternoon & at the Methodist Church in the Evening. This is the first time I have been at the Methodist Meeting since I came to this town to live. I took Frances & Mother to DE Witts Church before I went there & then after meeting was out I took them home again, that i went down after them & waited perhaps ½ an hour till their Meeting Broke.

16~2 [Monday, June 16, 1834]

Clear, Cloudy & Cool. I was engaged with McClure & Harris as Counsel today in Audit of Mr. W. Simontons Estate in hands of his Brother James against McCormick & McKinney Sat in Court house in Morning & in McCormicks office in afternoon was at my office till after 9 PM

17~3 [Tuesday, June 17, 1834] Cloudy & Rain. Engaged & made Speech before Auditors Seach, Wallace & Alricks, as yesterday in Same Matter in Court House, Harris, McCormick, Self, McKinney & McClure made speeches today in the order we are named – McKinney & McCormick on one Side. Paid for Sundries at Wilsons Hotel Geo Shott & Self 10 cts, Recd letter from Geo King Bellefonte Centre County Pa June 14/34 and wrote in reply to him Same day. Recd of Gottlieb Kreide on account of his note for \$5 & \$2 ½ that he owed before FEE \$1.06, was at my office till 9 P.M. – when I went home. Heavy thunder Gust between 9 & 10 P.M.

June 18 – 1834 Wednesday

day of mo 18~4 [Wednesday, June 18, 1834] Clear & pleasant, Anna Barbara Gibson daughter of Judge Gibson in town last Evening. All our Family but Myself took tea at Dr Edmund O. Roberts this Evening – I took tea at home as I did not wish to attend a tea drinking this Evening. Paid Richd T. Leach Co. Treasurer, \$28.69 ½ for Lots No. 266, 267, 269, 177, 178, 223 in PortsMouth Dauphin Co – bought by Chas. Carson & Myself at a Sale of the Same by the Said Co. Treasure for Taxes in this present Month – (having recd \$15 of the afosrd \$28.69 ½ of aforsd Carson this day) also at Same time pd aforsd Co Treasurer for Lots bought as aforesaid by Myself alone being No. 250, 161, 162 in Same Town \$16.90 – vide receipts in full in Both Cases in My pofsession. Drew check on “The Harrisburg Bank” in favor of Richd T. Leech Co. Treasr for \$30.59 & pd said as cash \$15 as labour.

Peacock left town this morning for Carlisle in Stage – for Chambersburg & Bedford Springs Paid for ½ a dozen of Ale at Weitzels for home sorts, took walk with & went to Murrays to See Mrs. Weidman with ‘Frances’ pd for Ice Cream at Ebermans 6 ¼ cts pd for [?] 6 ¼ cts.

21~7 [Saturday, June 21, 1834] Clear & pleasant – Paid Jacob (my valet) 12 ½ cts. Recd letters D.W. Roberts, Proty & Clk of SS. in Nos. 1, 2, 5, 6, 8, 14, 15, 19 being Comth vs Philips & same vs Miller & - vs Fribel – vs Minninger, - Buffington – Harrisvill – Baskins – Baskin of Aprl SS 1834 Depy Atty Generals Fees \$18. was at Supreme Court Morning and afternoon. Was at Peacocks & Shunks in the Evening with Frances & her Mother – “thunder Gust.”

24~3 [Tuesday, June 24, 1834] Clear, Cloudy & very warm, took my under Muslin Shirt off for the first time this Season Chief Justice Gibson in my office & got Tollers Law of Executors. Gave Wm. Shunk as he & Caspar were going to School 1 penny. Wrote note to James Boyd Present the relation to claim due me from himself & G. E Briggs Paid for Segars 6 ¼ cts. Paid for ice Cream at Ebermans with “Frances & Mother 25 cts –

25~4 [Wednesday, June 25, 1834] Clear & pleasant – I walked 4 miles this morning before breakfast & before 6 oclock A.M. & Met Mifs Buck, Smith, Briggs Cap, Cox & Cox & Henderson. Was at Supreme Court Morning & Afternoon. Took tea with Frances & her Mother along with Mrs Cox, Mrs Campbell & Mrs Watts these last two of Carlisle at Chas.
