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The Journal of Charles Rawn

November 26, 1835 to February 7, 1836 (Book 7)

Introduction

As a lawyer in Harrisburg, Charles Rawn had an impressive work ethic. Throughout most entries, he recorded the hours he spent in the office and in court. He spent many of his mornings in court, and he was usually at the office until 8:00 or 9:00 p.m. While in his office he wrote letters, prepared court documents, and met with clients. Once or twice a week he went to the Capitol and read law books or sat in the House chambers and listened to debates. He was passionate about politics and attended several lectures throughout this time period. The year 1836 was an election year, therefore he frequently reported on the status of the candidates. With a penchant for the public arena, Rawn met many high-ranking public officials. He had extensive contact with scores of lawyers in the Central Pennsylvania area as well as Philadelphia, Maryland, and New York.

Unfortunately, Rawn did not give many details of his personal life. He did have a wife, Frances, and a nine-month old daughter, Elizabeth. At one point he boasted of his daughter's accelerated growth, which hinted at a proud father. When he mentioned Frances, he reported how much money he gave her "for her own use." On occasion he would list her friends who were at the house for tea. Their house was rented from his mother-in-law, Mrs. Clendenin, who seemed to be a continual presence. Perhaps the reason was because she was a new grandmother.

When Rawn could enjoy an hour or two of leisure time, he often took three- or four-mile walks along the Susquehanna River. He did some light reading, and obtained his books from the McGowan's circulating library. After a long day of work, he frequently joined colleagues at a local hotel for a glass of wine or ale. Additionally, he attended one or two parties each week. These gatherings were comprised of Harrisburg's social elite, and Rawn was sure to document any influential person he met there. He conversed with the Governor and Governor-elect, Presidential candidates, the Mayor, members of Congress, and fellow lawyers.

Church membership was important to Rawn. He divided his time between the Episcopal and the Presbyterian churches. He attended church on Sunday mornings and evenings, and sometimes during the mid-week. Elizabeth, his baby girl, was baptized at the "Presbyterian Church." When he shared his pew with members of society, he recorded their names in his journal.

The transcription of Rawn's journal from November 26, 1835, through February 7, 1836, concludes with tables of personal expenses and an extensive list of every individual mentioned in his journal. When possible, their relationship to Rawn is also given.

The Journal

November 26, 1835 Thursday

26-5 Clear and moderate, Court of Common Pleas now in session. I wrote to M. Oftitzer (client) in answer to his letter 10 inst. There was an alarm fire in town today at 10:1/2A.M. on Front Street. It occurred in a frame office occupied by Richard Leac Esqr.

River and occasioned much bustle some terror among the near neighbors to it. It was got under [control] indeed it did not get to break out. I paid for this blank book at Mrs Graydon's Esqr. 25 cts. Took tea with mother Frances. Joseph and Mary the baby and Mr. Jurre I. Eifys (?)—Sarah. Henry McBlumchend came to my office, where I remained til 9:00P.M.. They are to call again tomorrow. Mrs. A. Aulis also in my office.

Friday, November 27

27-6 Cloudy, damp, snow. I rec'd Fee \$5. Of Samuel Henry to bring back against Robert Stockton. Rec'd Letter from D.W. Rawn "Phila. Nov 25/35" written the copy of an advertisement by Yearly Eavason of my colt for sale, enclosed (in file) and wrote to DWR in reply and also in reply to his letter Rec'd on the 23rd. Inst. and pd. pos. on my reply 12 1/2. Paid D. Hummel, Jr. saddle for tack 5-6. Mr Pleuak (?) and wife and Mrs. Curtin a relation of Kevin took tea with us. I was at my office till 9 1/4 P.M.

28-7 Clear, cloudy, cold. 1 1/2 or 2 weeks of snow on the ground. Handed Frances to buy oil for house 50 cts. Paid. [Securing] a witness for Mary Meden in no 96 of Aug. 1, 1834. And no.106 Nov.1 1833 out of \$2.72 1/2 retained for me for that purpose in the 17 Oct. last of \$2 in full of his witness fees (v. his Receipt) Paid Barbara Smith (a Yellow girl) in full for cleaning up my office Presence of our girl Doreas(?) and Mr. I.C. 50 cts in full—Mr. Oliver the members elect from Mercer County paid me an hour's visit in my office this morning. Mrs. I.C. Grimshaw at our house after tea and spent evening. I went home with them at 9:1/4P.M., when going from my office.

29-1 Clear and very cold. I put on my [cotton flannel] drawers having had brown Holleured(?) ones on to this day. I was at DeWitts Church morning, evening. Frances there with me in the morning The Gov. elect Jos. Ritner was there in the morning and there were 30 other [church] members of Ly. And Frances went to prayer meeting in afternoon. I finished reading "Clinton Bradshaw."

November 30, 1835 Monday

30-2 Day of month 30—Clear and very cold. Much ice in the river. Took 3 or 4 mile walk between 4 and 5. S. Clarke. office unit at [Seat of Laurel.] Henry against Robert Stockton had him arrested. Was with Frances at a Small party at M. Grimshaws. Esqr. and went home at 9:1/2P.M. Jos. Bowers was in my office this evening on his way to city.

Tuesday, December 1

1-3 Clear, more moderate. Beautiful. Penna. Leg. meets today. I referred to F. Wyeth's Circ. Lib. "Clinton Bradshaw" Offered him for use of same 2 volumes 1 week 12 ½ cts. We have orphans court today. I took long walk in the afternoon from 4 to 5 P.M. Went with Frances after ten to L.D. Pallerans Esqr. Left her, went to Peacocks a short time and then came 6—to my office. I bought of a Mr. Mr.Koser of Mine [butchering] Cumberland County a hind quarter of beef 112 lbs for \$5.00 Rec'd by the hands of Mm. Mendenhalls of the H of Rep.a letter from Yearsley Eavenson "Thornberry Del..Co Nov26 1835" informing me that he intends selling my colt on the 12 inst. I went to S. D. Patterson, Esqr at 9 1/2P.M. where there was a party for Frances Mary.

2-4 Clear, Cold. Paid Mother Clendenin on acct. Of Frances and my boarding \$15.

Handed Frances for her own use of \$2. Paid Firk for 1 pint of Brandy 25 cts –Rec'd letter from Jas. Pollock, Esqr "Milton Pa. –30/35 acknowledging he received it of mine (with a promissory note afterwards enclosed) of the 25th of last month and paid 10 cts.

Also rec'd letter from Mrs. Lydia McClintock "Phila.—29/35" I got "Horse Shoe Robinson" "a tale often tiny ascendancy" by the author of "Swallow Barn" from M.

Gowans Cir. Library. G. Baker, Esqr. Donation from Phila. Spent an hour at our house this evening. I spent the evening after supper at home, was in court nearly all day.

Served a [warrant] on Herman Kruk, atty. to declare in 4 weeks in 241 of April 7, 1835 [Albert and Parke in Newlaken.(?).]

Dec. 3rd 1835—Thursday

3-5 Clear, Cold, Canal froze up last night or night before. Thick ice in the river. I was at the capitol this morning where they were electing their officers in both houses. Shucks(?) of the town was elected clk.[clerk] of the H or Rep. a station that F. Rohunk Esqr. has filled for 15 or 17 years all the offices he changed in the House [and also] in the estate.

Misses H. Grimshaw and M. Peacock took tea with us. I took in my office between 6 and 9P.M.. Present Charles Herslen (?) The deposition of A.O. Hirster on a commission rec'd by me from Maryland on the 15th of Oct. last after having this day been first affirmed before M. Darres, Esqr. To execute s'd commission [printing].

4-6 Cloudy Some sleet, Rain, Cold. Received letter of Geo. Shoop, Esqr. Of perry Co. in answer to mine of the 23rd of last month, saying he had complied with my directions then given and pd.pos. 6 cts. Enclosed to Otto H. Williams, Esqr. blk of Northampton Co. Court at Hagenstown MO. Commission documents rec'd from them on the 15th October last. Together with the testimony of O. Hester (?) Taken by me last evening. bought for house 2 pair of Fowls (?) This evening alive at 25 cts per pair. Paid for 1 Qt. of Lamp oil for office at Smalls Co. 31 1/4. To R. Shunk, Esqr. at my office this evening between 8 and 9P.M.. Had small "Fly Around" in Court today with Lewis Wyeth, Esqr. was at my office till 9P.M.

5-7 Clear, Cloudy, windy. I was in court this morning. Wrote to Tho. Evans adjr. Isaac Lawrence du(?) Phila in relation to the contents of the letter rec'd 21st of last month. Rec'd letter from Adam Barker "----- Dec. 5, 1835" Wrote to him in reply—I this day in my office Printed to ---- Misters house with the ----Faust now occupies for one year from the 1 April 1836 upon the same terms in all respects as he now occupies it (vide[?] old agreement in the hands of Shock, Esqr.)

6-1 Clear very cold. Frances her mother Jos. and self at Dewitts Church this morning. I went to the Episcopal Church in the Evening with Mary and her Mother to her the Rev. Matsare(?)

December 7, 1835, Monday

7-2 Clear Cloudy very cold. Rec'd letter from D.W. Rawn "Phila. Dec.4, 1835") my answer to mine of the 27 of last month. W.Jefferson's son of Cheyney Efferis (?) Du. of Chester Co. formerly teacher in the neighborhood where I taught and C. Manly(?) of Cheyney and called at my office this morning. I have not seen him for 7 or 8 years. I went to the capitol to the office of the Sec'y of the Com'th with him which places he has never before been at. Heintztermarr(?), Esqr at young atty of Phila. At one house today with Miss. J. Grimshaw. Gent. Cameron took tea with us. Th. M. Culloh, Esqr. on house went to a party with Frances, Mary, and Josp. at M. Grimshaw Esqr. where we met the new Atty. Genl. I Todd of Fayette Co. Lady Darragher(?) of the Senate, Matts. of the H of Rep.

8-3 Clear, Cloudy, Windy, Cold, Rec'd letter from I.M. G. Irsure(?), Esqr. "Del. Co. Dec.5/35" and pd. pos. 12 ½ inches. Pd for sundries yesterday at Williams' 6 ½ cts pd. for sundries at M.Hale 5 cts. Handed Frances for her own use of \$2. Deposited in "The Harrisburg Bank" \$40. V. Bank Book Signed petition to the Governor elect—Jos. Ritner for Jacob Duck for Prvst. Office of this county. Wrote letter to Edward P. Pearson, Esqr. atty at Law of Lebanon, Lebanon Co. enclosing the following note for collection and pd. pos. 12 ½ on 2nd letter and

"I or my heirs or attnys promise to help or cause to be" paid unto Joseph Power his heirs or attnys the just sum of \$10. good and lawful money of Penn to be paid on or before the fifth day of April in the year 1826 for value rec'd arbitration this 30th day of Jan. 1831

“Mrs. June Costin took tea with us. I was at my office till 9P.M. McCulloh Baker at our house.

9-4 Clear, milder, Paid for a load about ½ cord of Hickory wood \$2 ¼. Rec'd letter from Jos. Bowers Esqr. “Phila. Dec. 5 1835”. Gentleman was in my office this morning he paid me the pos. paid on treasurer letter rec'd. Yesterday, 12 ½ cts. on his [B's witnesses]. Rec'd letter from S. Chew, Esqr. “Phila. Dec. 7/35.” Paid Darryl Smith (cold man) for sawing and putting away the wood. I bought today 80 cts. was at the Governor's room other places with Jos. Bowers, Esqr. to apply for an Aldemanship (?) parking Bowers Jos. (?) at my office this Evening.

December 10th, 1835, Thursday

10-5 Clear, Cold, Windy. Handed Frances 50 cts. Paid for sundries at Williams 6 ¼. I was at the Capitol this morning from 10 ½ to 12 (noon) walked 3 or 4 miles between 4 and 5 ½ P.M. was at my office till 9P.M. Reading “Horse Shoe Robinson” by Reunion.

11-6 Clear, Cloudy, Cold. I was at R.W. this morning after the 2nd More “Shoe Robinson” where I met Mrs. M. Mahany. Pd. for Sundries at M. Cull 6 1/4. Myson Reed (?) and Dawn of H of Rep at our house after dinner. Sonnie (?) kissed our daughter Eiz'th. Says she is as large as his daughter of 15 months old. Our is only 9 (mos. old.) Paid for ½ peck of eating apples for my office 4 cts. Miss Eliz'th Shunk, niece of G. and R. Shunk and daughter of Isaac of Phila. Earn (?) to law. Dust nights. Sloth at Shunk where I called to see her. M. and M. Grimshaw and Monhurton(?) Took tea with Frances

Giff (?). Rec'd note (file) from "Marriages" to Maryuration(?) Bull to be given at Wilson's Catel(?) next Tuesday Evening. Was at my office till 8 ½ P.M. after which I went home from our house first with Mrs. Wharton, and then with Skip N. Elmhauer (?).

12-7 Snow. 2 ½ or 3 inches deep on the ground this morning—Rain, Sleet. Rec'd letter from E. P. Pierson "Lebanon Dec. 11/35" answering of 9th unit paid 6 cts. Kind in reply. Also rec'd letter Mm. Atter(?) "Highspire Dau Co Dec. 11/35" Paid for oyster at M.Hall 6 1/4. R. Cotton Lady.

Mrs. Peacock Lady took tea with us this evening. I finished reading the novel called "Horse Shoe Robinson" by [Kennedy] a Lawyer of Baltimore and pd at McGowans circulating Library for its use 12 ½ cts in full. Was at my office till 9 ½ P.M..

13-1 Clear, Thawing, Town over flowing with people—delegates to 2 conventions—office [staff] and others – and self at our own church in morning and in evening by self. In the morning it was crowded and full. 4 generally 5 per pew. Very full in evening. The Rev. M. Judd(?) preached. Dewitt not in town. The two conventions to assemble tomorrow are "whig" –Masonic to nominate an opposition candidate to Van Buren for the Presidency. It's "no go" Martin will but any thing they can bring the files "all hollow" and do [repeal].

December 14, 1835 Monday

14-2 Clear and moderate. [Antes] Snyder, son of Governor Snyder dined with us yesterday. Wrote letter to [V.]R. Strunk, Esqr. (Persons) on subject of myself entering

into a Law Partnership and my holding forth in same office with him, or my purchasing home—paid for a pair of green shoes at Bellman and Jones for Frances of \$1.75. Paid Caspar Rhawn \$150 in full of [his deserved] money rec'd from Avery Stoddard Esqr. Dayton Ohio on the 8th of last month after retaining and running out of \$207.44 there rec'd by me any exchange and Fee \$57.44 sent Caspar Rhawn receipt in my receipt book and Wm. Cahete and Mr. Williamson, volunteers and others are coming to town in Swarms to witness the inauguration of Jos. Ritner tomorrow

15-3 Clear, very cold. At 9 ½ or 10A.M. I went to the Capitol with Frances and H. Grimshaw on each arm in company with Mr. Judge Gibson, Mrs. Costin, Mrs. Bribben and others. At 12 noon when the Governor and Gov. elect and procession came to the Capitol and from that on during the ceremony great disorder [fighting] and were occasioned at the door by hiring [attendants to avoid the risk]—The military were the principal cause, in their movement to preserve it, of all the disorder that was made satisfied me [that] the occasion did not require a military force, and that the doors [often] to be thrown open to all after the ladies and girls went, and members and few others of immediate correction until the ceremony were seated – The oaths which were by the “Uplifted Hand” was administered by T.S. Cunningham Sr. of the Senate in an audible and firm voice after which Gov. Ritner delivered (very badly) a very good inaugural address – He had a cold and pronounced very dignified – Mr. and Mrs. Costin, Geo. Martin, Jr. the [cutter] of Phila. Co. were at our house after tea.

16-4 Clear, windy, very cold. Carlisle volunteers and others – 4 or 5 companies left town this morning, there are two conventions, Whig and Anti-Masonic setting here now upon the subject of the next Presidency – both strongly opposed to Van Buren and the latter much crowded rec'd letter with enclosures, Commission and interrogations from the court of [Chaucery] Washington Co. MD. R.J. Barmtz “Hagerstown Dec 15, 1835” making me come to take the dep. of [offices]

Was at Bruhling Road. Room.

December 17th 1835 Thursday

17-5 Clear, Cloudy, very Cold. The River closed up entirely to day at this place. The Anti Masonic Conventions this day nominated Wm. A. Harrison and Frances Grange as their Candidates for the Presidency and Vice Presidency. I pd. Briggs (Barber) for cutting my hair 12 ½. I took 3 or 4 glasses of wine at Shunks at 2 ½ P.M. With the Exec. Of Com'th W. Findlay Esqr. was at a large party with my wife at Wm. Grimshaw Esqr [where was ? borrows of this com'th] Miss Ritner a daughter of Gov. Ritner and Mary minor personages went home at 10 ½ P.M.

18-6 Cloudy, cold, snow. Rec'd 2 letters from Capt. M. A. Cheyney (my first cousin) dated Phila Nov.28 and 30, 1835 by the hands of Capt. Jos. Robinson the first and introductory letter and the other a statement of the Sr. Capt Robinson, character, business, circumstances and witness at this plan and requesting for him. My exertion to procure his apportionment as “[carbon] Masters” in Phila....which I have promised him. Wrote to Sylvia M. Clintock in answer to her letter rec'd 2nd Oct. Paid to Alexander Ruy. A

collection for the Washington National Monument to be erected in Washinton City to the memory of Gen. Washington under the Superior tendence of a society of which Ex. Pres. Madison is the Pres contribution \$1. Subscr'd petition for H. Peffer to Gov. Ritner to appoint and Sent Henry Peffer [Register and Render] for Dauphin County.

19-7 Cloudy, Rain and Sleet. Capt Jos Robinson called at my office this morning. I went with him to the office of Wm. Grimshaw Esqr. where we met and were introduced by G. to a Wm. Waters of Phila with which two Gentlman Grimshaw went to call in Gov. Ritner he being in with the Gov. elect and they being applicants for office. I was opposed to Ritner and in favor of Wolf. Was at my office after supper. short time

20-1 Rain and Sleet. Streets very slippery. Frances and self took to our church with us Mrs. Sleut Revere-Hertzel—called at her mothinlaws for her. I was at Shank's. Cox and Galbraiths in afternoon. Called at [Cullin's] place to see Capt Robinson as Cox to see A. Hieden. And saw the Smiths of Franklin Co. at Shunks. I was at my own church in the evening by myself.

December 21, 1835 Monday

21-2 Clear. Cloudy, Thawing. Wrote to Capt. M Cheyney by Capt. Jos. Robinson in answer to his communication. Rec'd 18 inst. Paid for sundries on Saturday Evening last 6 ¼ cts. Paid for sundries today 6 ¼ cts. Was not at my office after supper.

22-3 Clear and moderate. Frances accompanied Miss Van Buren, wife of Briggs, and Mrs. Leslie to the Capitol this morning. I p'd for sundries at Confections 6 ¼—I bought for Mother Clendenin a fore quarter of beef of a York County man at 4 cts per lb. Wrote to A.M. Jamisons (and kept copy) in answer to a letter handed to me by Mr. Prady and on file. Sent notes in my copy. Mr. Forster in my office today. And left 3 letters and requested me to bring 2 certain docts. Adjourn. J.Mehaffey and Jas. S. Law which I did. Paid Mother Clendenin on acct. of Frances and my Boarding \$5. In purchase of a fore q. of beef today. Handed Frances at Peacocks for her own use 75 cts to send to Phila for a Belt by Jane and Fanny Peacock who go to the city to night for the first time with Geor. Baker Senator. Frances Mary and self there till 8 ½ P.M. and then went home. L. Wyeth Esqr. with Mary.

23-4 Clear. Frozen hard. Pleasant winter night. I was not at my office in the afternoon being indisposed by a cold. Com. Elliotts daughter Mary and Harriet and other ladies at our house at 4 P.M. I got dose of medicine from Dr. Rutherford. Wrote at post office to A. Fitzwater and directed to the care of E.F. Perrypacker Esqr. of H of Rep. “Schuylkill and Chester Co. for deed to Martin Kendig. Spent evening at home.

24-5 Clear and pleasant, hard frozen. I was engaged as counsel for Gen. M. Forster. Left before arbitrating at Shells Tavern Barney Rock being kept from 11A.M. to 1 ½ P.M. Took walk from 3 ¼ to 4 P.M. Rec'd invitation to a party at Henry Ahvards. I did not go but my wife did. I was indisposed with cold. Rec'd letter from Isaac Myers “Port Clinton Schuylkill” Co. “Dec. 22/35” and pd. pos. 10 cts. Spent evening at home.

25-6 Cloudy, moderate. Our family all dined and [sipped] at Mr. Peacocks. Miss A.B. Gibson daughter of Chief Jus. also there. Mild all day. Some rain and afternoon unpleasantly damp. Frances, self Joseph and little Black girl went home with Baby at 8 P.M.

December 27, 1835 Saturday

26-7 Cloudy, muddy. Rain. Rec'd in [Eurich adm. Of Eurich and Newbeker adm.] and No.253 ap. T. 1835 credited by Prof. Roberts to one in my Acct for writs Atty. Legal Fee \$3—Paid for a Box of Dr.Lance Jacksons Losenges at Lutz's 37 ½ cts. Rec'd letter from Jas Pollock Esqr "written Dec.23/35" [popos] 10 cts (ten cent.) Enclosed 2nd letter in one written to Wm. A. Atlee Highspire Dau Co. Sent it by Jas. W. Jefferis. A cent for stamps—Paid M. Miles shoemaker in full for patching Burnt boot and under-laying [Morocco] boots and toes and in full of all demands 31 ¼ cts. I wa at my office till 9 P.M. Taking the Deposition of A. O. Hirster on Commission and rec'd 16th inst. Returned Commission rec'd on 16th inst. written testimony of A.O. Hirster to Otto H. Williams Clk of the Washington Co Court. Mailed and wrote to R.J. Brent Esqr in relation thereto—

27-1 Cloudy, blustery. I was in the house all day. We had no church at our church today. Frances went to the Episcopal church with Mary. She and Mary started to go to meetings at our church in the afternoon until found there was none

28-2 Clear, Cold, hard frozen. Rec'd letter from Matthew S. Richards "Reading Dec 26/35" with a draft on "The Farmers Bank of Reading" for \$50. On acct. of a Bal of about \$101.26 due to Geo. H. Berghaus by him assigned to T.J. Shewell, pd. pos. 10 cts and cashed 2nd check at "The Harrisburg Bank" where I at same time Deposited \$50. Wrote to Isaac Myers Port Clinton acknowledging the receipt of his letter of rec'd on the 24 mo, and also acknowledging the Receipt of his letter of rec'd on the 24 inst. and also acknowledging the Receipt of the S. \$50. On account and kept Copy. Rec'd letter from Jacob Ramp. "Hummelstown Dec26/35" requesting me to attend to certain business. Eliz'th Shunk and Nancy daughter of Isaac and F.R. in my office this afternoon. Sent Doris our Black Girl niece [second] time for and [pd/for] by her at [Firks] 12t of molasses for my cold 16 ¼ cts.

29-3 Clear, Cloudy, moderate. Dr. Rutherford came to see me today and gave me an Elixure and some pills being very bilious. I remained at home all day

30-4 Cloudy, Some Snow afternoon. I was at home all day Rutherford called to see me. Mr. Grimshaw Esqr gave me a call, I am [weak] nearly all the time. Am better today

Dec. 31, 1935 Thursday

31-5 Clear, Cloudy, Cold. I came to my office this morning at 10A.M. W.M. Clure Esqr called and proposed that I should take part in a certain named case with him. Wrote to Jacob Rawn Jr. in answer to his letter rec'd 28 inst. Rec'd letter from D.B. Carter merchant—"Phila Dec 29/35" Pd. pos. 12 ½ and wrote to him in reply the same day.

Wrote note to H.K. Strong Esqr/Present to pay certain money. I called at Wm. R. DeWitts (Rev) and talked with him about one hour on the subject of my admission to the Church.

January 1, 1836, Friday

1-6 Clear and beautiful. I took ride on gray horse of N. Henries from 10 to 11 A.M.

Paid for 9 oz. of wafers at Peacocks 25 cts. Rec'd letter from Capt. M. Cheyney "Phila Dec 29, 1835" in answer to mine of 21st of last mo. "Our Family" dined today by invitation with W. Grimshaw Esqr and daughter, Frances and I went to meeting after tea where I remained after service and underwent an examination by "the session" Rev. DeWitt, R. T. Leach. Mr. Grayson Esqr. A Grayson. M.Nelson. [Began] preparatory to an admission to the membership in the church. Returned home at 9P.M.

2-7 Clear and Beautiful. The River at this part broke up yesterday. Rec'd of M. G. Isaacs \$30 for 1 quarters rent ending on 31 Dec. past for M. Nister's house. Paid C. 4-2 Rain and snow and sleet on the ground. Dr. Geo A. Berghaus is my office has been West and South. Rec'd letter from R.J. Brins Esqr. "Hagerstown Jan 1/1836" with fee \$5 enclosed popos 10 cts and wrote in reply and sent copy

4-2 Cont'd. Paid mother Clendenin per Mary S. Clendenin \$15 amount of Frances and my boarding. Handed Frances for her own use \$1. Paid Antes and Berryhill. Stove bill by Frances for herself. Child and black girl and 2 pair stockings for myself in full \$20.07 (v. Bill and Receipt on file) and at same time in the way of settlement rec'd of Henry Antes Fee\$20. for professional rendered for him in suits No.349 and 350. 1824 in Dauphin Com. Pleas. Pd. Dr. Wm. Rutherford on account for medical services to my family \$10. (v. my receipt book) I spent the Evening at home.

5-3 Cloudy. Foggy. Wet, muddy, very dull. I called at Mrs. Musgraves to see about buying beef and pork in market for her which she wished me to do. Paid my postage bill in full for the quarter ending Dec.31/35. \$5. v.Bill and receipt. I was engaged this afternoon in making admin. for David Forney. Paid for [wine] at Maron's Hall 6 1/4. Had invitation to party at [Lechis] did not go. Evening too [cold] Stayed at home.

6-4 Cloudy, Soft, Muddy. Wrote note to H.Strong Esqr. Present on same subject as on 31 of last mo. Rec'd of David Forney admin'd of Jos. Forney sent for stating his

administration account Fee\$5. Pd. M. Kunkle for mending office door knob. Present Tobias Stendruk, vsd. I was at meeting after tea with Frances.

7-5 Cloudy, cold, hard frozen. Snow and Sleet in evening. John H. Brinton Esqr. of West Chester at my office today. I introduced him to Joseph my brother-in-law and through him to Peacock's family. Paid for 1 lb. of charcoal for my office 25 cts. Went with Ms. Clendenin to Shunks at 7P.M. Then to my office and back for her at 8 ½ P.M.

8-6 Rain, moderate, Slush, hail. I was engaged in taking deposition this morning before Esqr. Davies from 9A.M. to 11A.M. Was in the convention in court House some time. At 7 ½ P.M. a large group of 150 or 200 Gentlemen sat down to a supper at "Misons Hotel" in Com. of the bu. at New Orleans in 1815. Peter Wager of Phila presided Mr. M. Reed Esqr made a speech. I (and each of us) paid \$1 for supper. I paid Esqr Davies \$1.50 for talking deposition for Philip Newly in orphans court.

January 9, 1835 Saturday

9-7 Cloudy. Soft. Slushy. Rec'd letter from R.J. Brent Esqr "Hagerstown Jan. 1, 1836" in answer to mine of 4th inst. I was in the convention till 1P.M. and at [post] office in afternoon

10-1 Cloudy. Snow, hail. Sleet, Slush. I was at our church morning and evening. None of the rest of our family there weather so bad. Sally Crawford of Chambg. daughter of G.Hartley Esqr died yesterday.

11-2 Cloudy, colder, snow on the ground 4 or 5 inches. Rec'd letter A. Barker "Carlisle Jan. 9, 1836" and wrote to him in reply. I was at the Capitol from 10 ¼ A.M. to 1 P.M. was at a large party after tea at Esqr Brooks where I entered with Mrs. J.W. Haldeman and took her home at 10 ½ P.M. Sleigh running today. Sleighing only tolerable. Our Eliz'th setting on her mother's lap kicked over the table and broke the shade of our [Astral?] Lamp. Met Harriet Grimshaw who took supper with us there at the time.

12-3 Clear, moderate and thawing. Some sleighs running. M. C. Bruher for his 3 wards. Charles, Eliza and Sarah McClintock and myself for Sydia Mclintock (whose interest I own) and for her daughter Mary and for Joel Bailey guardian of Jas. McClintock this day rented to Mrs. Mary Anderson ([vide] the article of argument in the hands of Wm. Catrell, and witness thereto) part of the Estate of Jas. M Clintock. Du. for 1 year from 1 April 1836 to 1 April 1837 for which she paid as in advance in full for the whole year \$47.17 (discounting \$50 for a year). Of which I got for the interests I represented 1/3 for widow and 2/5 of 2/3 for Mary Bailey \$28.30 and Bruher got for his work the Bal. of \$47.17 being \$18.87 for his 3 wards. Rec'd of Jacob Seiler adm. of M. Hovis Du. \$11.00 Debt and \$1.28 being in full of a note of \$10 originally owing to me as a fee from Char Swagger on which I lend him in Dec.1834 and obtained a rcpt. for sum of \$11.00 upon this I opened an Ex. on which this sum Swagger filed his Bond in Dau. C. Pleas with S. Hovis his bail to take Ben. of Ms S. which Bond was forfeited. Paid for apples 6 ¼—Was at my office till 9 ¼ P.M.

January 13, 1836 Wednesday

13-4 Cloudy, moderate, slushy—rec'd letter from Mr. Maldron Halifax “Dau. Co Jan 11/36” Paid M. Davies Esqr \$1.03 in full of the [cents of the court of pleas] . Swagger referred to yesterday (V. his receipt) Paid C.L. Berghaus and father (V. Bill and Receipt) for wood bought in Sep. 1835. \$1.50 this is in full of all demands between them and me from me to them. I was at the Capitol, this morning and afternoon with Frances and several other ladies and gentleman attending to a very interesting debate in H. of Rep. upon the subject of taking Ex. Gov. Wolf, who had refused by letter to appear before an “anti Masonic Committee” to Ex. the Evils of Fair Masonry” into the custody of the Sec’y of Amer. of the House. I also attended the setting of W. Comter in the “Sup. Ct. Room where F. R. Shunk Esqr. was called as a witness and declined being sworn and had his reasons, other persons also declined being sworn. I went to Shunks from the Committee Room. Mrs. S. D. Patterson wife of the Ed. of the Penna. Ref. was there with whom I went home and then went to my office and home at 9 ½ P.M.

14-5 Clear, moderate. I rec'd of M. Blurrs by the hands of M. Dougherty—Fee \$10. on [out] of Profes. Services in Sect. no.212 of Aug. 7, 1830 in Dauphin Co. Pa. Present Alders Barker and Priest Currans Brother, Mrs. Eliz'th orth. widow of Adam orth. Esqr, who died a year or two since, died yesterday at her Mothers. Mrs. Cox's in this Borough of a decline, under 20 years of age leaving a Son Adam near 2 years old—She [furnished] during a protracted illness and in her last trying him and closing scene, the gratifying and undoubtful assurances that she was “born again” and renewed by the Spirit of the Holy Ghost. She was an intimate and much loved friend of my wife. We have the consolation

in her death that her spirit has winged its flight to it's everlasting resting place in the "Bosom of her savior and her God." I was at the Capitol this afternoon where Ex. Gov. Wolf was brought before a Com. on an attachment for declining to appear on a Subp. to testify as to the evil of Free Masonry. He declined and refused to be sworn. I was engaged in my office from 7 to 8 ½ P.M. in taking the Depositions of A. [Bluk] and David Cummings Esqr before M. Davies Esqr, Rec'd letter from A. Gern Esqr "Phila, Jan.9—1836" Pd. Pos. 12 ½ cts. Wrote to K.Ohnio Esqr for \$52.97. [police on money to 13 inst.] Wrote to Jas. Pollock Esqr in answer to his letter of 26 last mo. and sent for dep. taken today

January 15th, 1835 Friday

15-6 Clear. Colder. At 10A.M. I got a one horse carriage of N. Henrie in which I took my wife and Mrs. C. Wharton to the funeral of Mrs. E. Orth. She was buried at the family Burying Ground 4 mikles from the Borough up the river. We returned at 1 P.M. I rec'd letter from H.K. Strong Esqr for M. Pomeroy (Client) \$40 on account of his written obligation and rec'd and returned my Fee\$10 out of S.\$40 at the rate of 25 percent int. Pd. Alden Barker (Atty. for Pomeroy) \$63.75 being the Bal. in full of Pomeroy's money in my hand. Rec'd of Strong on the 9 and 22 of Oct. last on the 16 Nov. last and today, having rec'd at those 4 several periods \$85. and rec'd out of the same as the monies there paid my fees at 25 percent being \$21.25 out of the S. \$85, and pd. back aforesaid the Bal. \$63 ¾ (V. his Receipt) this day. I was at a Party at Judge Fahnestocks. Went and came away with M. S. Clenderini [my sister]. We left at 10 ½ P.M. I rec'd introduction to

Miss Van Buren [client cen.] of Martin and to Senator Meihle of Northampton Co. I rec'd last Mo. of "Dem. St. Journal" 12 inst.

16-7 Cloudy, and Cold, very hard Frozen all day. Paid W.P. Hays Cabinet maker in full of all demands (V. his Receipt) 87 ½ cts. Wrote to Mrs. Sydia McClintock (client) "No.7 Grays Alley Phila." Also to Wm. Lackey Esqr of Perry Co. about sent No.21 to Aug. 2, 1835 in Perry Com. Pleas Evans adm'd of Lawrence v. Lindley and [Luke]—and pd. pos. 6 cts. Was at my office till 9 ¼ P.M. and there walked up and down the Board way to the Capitol a mile or two.

17-1 Cloudy, Snow, Some Sleighing. I was at our own church morning, Evening. Frances there in the morning, at which time the Rev. Mr. Morgan Pres of the Western University preached and where the Rev. Mr. Sproul of the Phila preached in the Evening, Messrs. Strohm, McCulloh and Keating sat with me in my pew.

18-2 Cloudy, Snow, clear, Sleighing. Our Court commenced its regular term today. I was appointed by the court to prosecute for this term for James Tod the present Atty. Gen'l succeeding Geo. M. Dallas the S. Tod having thus far neglected to appoint a Depy. for this Co. Rec'd letter from Henry Schreiner Esqr. of this Co. no date by the hands of M. Stitzer accompanied by Wm. Nicole.

January 18, 1835 Monday

18-2 Cont'd I rec'd of the M. Stitzer present Wm. Nicole, Fee \$5. I was at a very large Democratic meeting in favor of Van Buren and Johnson for the Presidency and Vice Presidency of the U.States, which was addressed by Geo. M. Dallas, Sam F. Reed of Phila and F. Johnson Esqr of this County and adjourned at about 9 P.M.

19-3 Clear, Cold, Some Sleighing. I was busy all day till 7 P.M. in Court. Then went in as a spectator 5 or 10 minutes to a "Harrison" meeting in the Court House where Gen'l Mark lately of the U.S. Senate from this State was eulogizing Harrison and abusing Martin Van Buren in a [shack]. I went to a large Gentleman's Party at Shunks where Ex. Gov. Wold, Geo. M. Dallas and other distinguished citizens attended. Broke up at 10 P.M.

20-4 Clear, Cold, thawed some. I rec'd letter from Jas. Mehaffey "Marietta Jan. 18/36" I was engaged in court all day. Mrs. Wharton and Miss Harriet Grimshaw took tea at our house and they and Mary S. and Frances and self went to meeting at Lesson Room opened Rev. Mr. Sproul. Mr. Roberts of Phila formerly of H. of Rep. was at our house this Evening. I went home at 9 ½ P.M. with Mrs. Wharton and Miss H. Grimshaw.

21-5 Clear. Cold. Our sessions ended this morning. Grand jury were discharged Tuesday and all the traverse jurors except 12 yesterday. I wrote to Jas. Mehaffey in answer to his letter Rec'd yesterday. I was at the Capitol this morning in company with "Frances" and many ladies and gentleman witnessing an important debate relative to holding in custody for contempt of the House Ex. Gov. Wolf. G.M. Dallas and 20 or 22

more Free masons for a contempt. I was also there in the afternoon from 3 to 5 ½ P.M. where I saw conversed with the Rev. Mr. M. Coskrey and was a "Large Gentleman Party" at S.D. Pattersons Esqr. from 8 to 9 ½ P.M. might have been 100 to 150 gentleman there. I was introduced by Mr Oliphant to Mr. McClellan his Brotherinlaw of H. of Rep from Fayette Co. to Mr. Stevens of Phila and to others. Paid for [cigars] 6 ¼ cts. Ex. Gov. Wolf, G.M. Dallas and other distinguished men at Pattersons Party.

January 22nd, 1836 Friday

22-6 Clear and moderate. Thawing some. I was at the Capitol on same subject as Yesterday from 11 ½ A.M. to 1 P.M. this afternoon from 3 ½ to 5 ¼ P.M. Was at a Very Large Ladies and Gentlemans Party at Peacocks also "Frances" Ex. Gov. Wolf and Gov. Ritner were there to which latter gentleman I rec'd introduction by Mr. Middlesworth Speak of H. of Rep. I rec'd into also to Miss Howell and to Mrs. Horace Wolf, Sl. Haldeman, Mrs. Muhler and others. Col. Page and Williams were there and [Surr.] We left at 10 ¼ P.M. I pd. for [cigars] 6 ¼

23-7 Clear and Cold. Shunk and self getting our offices papered today begun on the back Room. In Court this morning. Paid for 1 Qt. of Brandy at Firks, got by one girl [Kelly] and paid for by myself 25 cts. Paid for 1 Pair of gloves for self at [Ceuson Elders] 40 cts. I attended a theological lecture by a "Swedenborgian" in the Court House. Tolerably scientific Lec. I went after to my office and home at 9 P.M.

24-1 Clear in morning. Snow commenced at noon and snowed rest of day. 4 or 5 inches deep at 8 or 9 P.M. Frances and self at our own church in the morning and at Episcopal in Evening. I was at our own church in the afternoon and heard the Rev. M. Cook on the progress of popery in the U.States. He read much and tired the people more. Many left the church before he finished which did not disturb him in the least. Rev. Mr. Morgan preached at our church in the morning and Rev. Mr. Ridgeby at the Episcopal in Evening and morning.

25-2 Clear, Cold, Snow from 8-12 inches deep this morning. Sleighs going merrily. Mr. Wimble familiarly called. "Pap Trimble" late and since the adoption of our St. Constitution and before either Dept of Com'th of some other office about the Hill died at 6 P.M. at Dr. Reilys where he has long lived. W. is confidently that the barbarous and uncalled for act—of [turning] him from a station that he is identified with shortened his life (See daily paper) I took glass of ale at 9 P.M. with Shunk at Nagles Hotel. Mr. Wimble has enjoyed almost uninterrupted Health.

Januray 26, 1836 Tuesday

26-3 Clear. Moderate. Fine Sleighing. Rec'd letter from Jas. Mehaffey "Marietta Jan. 25/35" in answer to mine of the 21st instl. And pd. pos. 6- Also rec'd letter from Sister Juliann Rawn "Phila Jan/36" and pd. pos 12 ½. I was at the Episcopal Church this evening and heard the Rev. Mr. W. Coskrey preach very fine Sermon. Rev. M. Ridgley read prayers and after which I went to a very Large Party with S. Mary Scott, at Mrs. Henry Buchlers my wife being there already not having gone to church. Col. [Orr] was

there with his "Bride" went home at 11 P.M. my wife and other ladies sung and played Piano.

27-4 Clear. Cold. First rate Sleighing. I wa at the funeral of Jas. Trimble Esqr (v. 25 inst.) And walked with M. Grimshaw Esqr. Wrote to Jas. Mehaffey in answer to his letter of yesterday. Wrote to Martin Stambaugh "Sheriff of Perry Co." on same business that I wrote to Wm. Sackey upon in mistake on 16 [ultims] and sent letter to by Thomas Milligan of Liverpool Perry Co. Frances and self were at Lecture this Evening at our session room.

28-5 Clear and Cold. Fine Sleighing. Miss Nancy McCulloh of Chambersburg came to our House in the stage at 4 A.M. I handed Frances for her own use \$2. Was with Frances at a large Party at Mrs. Jacob M. Haldemans and home at 10 ½ P.M. M.K. Findlay Esqr. my fellow student in my office last eve. and Shunk and we went to Bruhlens Hotel and drunk some ale.

29-6 Clear. More moderate. Fine Sleighing. River closed again at this place night before last. Wrote to Thos. Chambers Esqr. in answer to his of 27 inst. I wrote letter to Mother Eliz'th Rawn and directed it to D.W. Rawn in answer to Julianns of 26th inst. and enclosed therein one from France to Julianne and note from self to Chas. A. Cheyney for a "Lamp Shade" and sent package and said letter by "Liberty [Fose]" Son of Sheriff Fose who started to the City at 1 P.M. with Jos. Wilson for the Penetentiary at 2 ½ P.M. Left our door (after paying N. Henries 12 ½ cts) in 2 Horse Sleigh of N. Henries with my wife

and child and Messers McCulloh and M. Peacock for “Dauphin” Stees 9 Miles. 2 other Sleighs containing Misses J. Todd, M. Briggs, A.E. Carson, H. Grimshaw, M. Leach, M.S. Clendenin and Mr. Briggs, Reed and Oliphant. Rep. [oster] and horse feed at Steer 18 $\frac{3}{4}$ cts. Toll going and coming 15 cts and home at 6 P.M.

Jan. 30, 1836 Saturday

30-7 Clear and moderate. I dined at F. R. Shunks Esqr by invitation in company with Ex. Governor Wolf, canal commissioners James Clarke, M. Mitchell, and Gen'l M. Coy Esqrs and M. K. Findlay Esqr. Went from dinner to court at 3 P.M. I tried for [peff] cause of Gen'l M. Forster v. Samuel Higgins No. 29 of Nov. 1834, and got through with same at 9 P.M. without going out to tea or court adjourning and then went to a Senate Party at Jas. Leslie's where I was introduced to a Mr. Newbold of Phila and Marts of New York, went home from S. Party at 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ P.M. with Misses Nancy McCulloh and M.S. Clendenine. Paid for [cigars] today at Buehlers Hotel 5 cts.

31-1 Clear. Cloudy. Moderate. We had our Daughter Eliz'th Baptised in the “Presbyterian Church” at 11 $\frac{3}{4}$ A.M. by the Rev. Wm.R. DeWitt (pastor) by the name of “Elizabeth Clendenine” her mother and self stood at the alter. Large congregation present. She behaved to the admiration of all. She was brought down to the church in her little carriage at 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ A.M. after her morning sleep by Doris and Kitty our Col'd girls. Her mother, Misses McCulloh, and M. Clendenine and self having gone to church at usual time. At own church in evening.

February 1-2 Clear. Cold. Sleighing continues first Rate. Rec'd letter from W. Chambers Esqr. "Chambersburg Jan. 31/36" in answer to mine of 29 inst also rec'd letter from Jas. Mehaffey "Marietta Jan. 28 1836" in answer to mine of 27th inst. with a check inclosed for \$226.50 in full of [Pair] material (the first being \$205.29 and the latter from 8 May 1834 to the 28 Jan. 1836 being \$21.21) to be pd by the S. Mehaffey on an agreement entered into May 8, 1834 by himself. J.S. Law and M. Forster by which the two former were to Hazeltine, Haddock, and Co. (V. Suit No.37 Jan. 7, 1836 Dau. Com. Pleas) \$205.29. Pd.pos. on his letter 6 cts. I wrote to M. Fryer of firm of "Fryer and Anderson" Phila on subject of Suit No. 38, Jan. 7, 1836 D.Com. Pleas, and Mehaffey's letter of today. Peacocks are moving today into house in Market Square bought of Miller's Estate. I attended Large meeting in Court House opposed to the Leg. of PA. Granting a charter to U.S. Bank was on the Com'ter to draft resolutions and made a speech. Went to canal Commissioner Clarks Room at Buehlers Hotel with Shunk where was Ex. Gov. Wolf, Dr. [Aukriser] and others. Bid [Clarke] goodbye.

February 2, 1836

2-3 Clear. Very Cold. I went to the Capitol Library from 10 to 11 ½ A.M. to consult Law Books not in my office. Paid for apples 2 cts. Frances went to a party at [Enfry's] with Miss Nancy McCulloh. I had time to go. Wrote to Charles Alexander Esqr. Phila Publisher of "The Gent. Vade Museum" in pursuance of a call at my office on Friday last by Robert F. Black and \$5. left with me by him to obtain to be sent to Hanover P.O. Dau. Co." for 1 year commencing on 1st of last mo. 2 copies of S. paper and enclosed in my 2nd letter a \$5. in full for S. [papers]. I took M. Roberts Esqr. late [propty] into case of

Espy v. Duneau adm. on trial lest for this week or [anulment] counsel for Def. Was at my office till 10 P.M.

3-4 Clear. Very Cold. Therm. at about Zero in the morning for some days past. I was at Capitol Library this Evening for Law Books. Took walk 1 ½ miles and back. Went to meeting at door with Frances then had to come to my office to meet a client where I stayed till 9 P.M. or 10 P.M. Then went to [Nelsons] Hotel to see Chambers.

4-5 Clear. Very Cold. Sleighing continues first rate. I was concerned all day till 10 P.M. In the trial of cause No.100 Aug. 1834 in Dauphin Com. Pleas. Espy for Espy v. Judge Dau. Came adm'd Col. Roberts and self for dept. I opened the case for def't and read and gave one testimony.

5-6 Clear. Very Cold. I was in Court till 10 ½ A.M. Then went to Senate Chamber with Miss Nancy McCulloh and other ladies where there was a discussion till 1 ½ P.M. About U.States Bank. Went to Peacocks at 3 P.M. With Miss N. McCulloh and M.S. Clendenine. Frances to see Misses Deuny Chambers. Then went to court at 3 1/1 P.M. Rec'd letter from M. Fryer "Phila. Feb.3, 1836" in answer to mine of 1st inst. and pd.pos. 12 ½ cts. Pd. Sundries 9 cts. I was at Peacocks this Evening to see Misses Chambers and Denny and went home with our girls. N.McCulloh and M.S. Clendenine, having gone there I think with them. M. Chambers Esqr was there and Jos. [Knon] Esqr. Senate Chamber quite crowded and much interest excited about the Bank Bill. Pd. Mother Clendenine of F's and my Boarding \$20—

February 6, 1836 Saturday

6-7 Clear and Cold. Went to Peacocks this morning at 9 A.M. in Tho. Chambers sleigh with himself and M. Ewing of H. of Rep. And went to the Capitol at 10 A.M. in S. Sleigh with Misses N. McCulloh, E.C. Peacock and M.S. Clendenin. Misses Chambers, Denny and others had gone up the first road. We left for dinner at 1 P.M. Rec'd of M.

Chambers Esqr admand of Hon. Tho Duneau du. on acct. of professional services in No.100 Aug. 1834 Dau. Com Pleas \$50 Fee, \$20 of which I shall hand to my colleague M. Roberts Esqr who I took into S. Cause with me on Tuesday last (only) to which M. Chambers afterwards attended. Took glass of wine at Mison's Hotel with S. Chambers and [Ruender] W.J. [Wain] of Phila. who went into a Rug. with P. Chambers to get a writ of Error in S. Suit above referred to. [Sequestered] the prop. of the Sup. Court being there also. About business of his letter Rec'd 28 Dec. last to choose Arbts. Monday next—I went to Peacocks door with Misses N. McCulloh and M.S. Clendenin and home for evening at 8 ½ P.M.

7-1 Clear till 3 P.M. Snowing Frances, Nancy, Mary and self went to our church together this morning and two latter and self to same in evening. No church at Episcopal today.
